1 Matters arising from the 2006 AGM

There were no matters arising from the minutes of the 2006 AGM. Approval of the minutes was proposed by Tom Cassells and seconded by Ben Ellis.

2 Chairmans Address

It is customary to start proceedings with an address by the Chairman and there is no reason why this year should be an exception.

2006 saw a somewhat re-jigged BAeA Committee, with Ben standing down after 7 years as Chairman. In taking over this mantle, I passed on the baton of Head of Contest Organisation to Steve Green and I am sure that all of you here today appreciate the tremendous amount of time and new energy Steve has brought to the job. To Steve I would like to offer my personal thanks and I'm sure you'd all join me in that.

Stability has been assured during this change-over by the continuation in their established positions of Nick, Jen, Martin, Anne, Eric and others. These people give generously of their time and bring enormous competence to everything they do on behalf of the Association. We owe them, too, a great debt of gratitude.

In general terms the Association in 2006 worked much along traditional lines, but we set in motion some initiatives which we will enlarge in 2007

and which we hope will continue to bring the sport aerobatics to a wider audience.

We will have more Classic events this year, and more Beginners' events, including one aimed specifically at qualified aerobatic instructors.

We have been very pleased to accept invitations from some new host airfields for 2007: Dunkeswell, Shobdon and Wellesbourne Mountford. As a result we have planned a more active season for this year than ever before.

This is ambitious, and there is a risk that with such expansion we will bite off more than we can chew. This is my main concern: that we will provide more activities but in the process that we will totally overwork and exhaust the patience of those volunteers at the core of the organisation.

Therefore, I am making an appeal now, to all flying members of the Association, to ask that you look at how you might help behind the scenes on occasion in addition to the times that you enter as a competitor. The Association can only be successful in proportion to the enthusiasm and contribution of its members. So I ask you all to try to do just that little bit more in 2007.

You all have access to the principal committee members charged with overseeing different areas of the Association's activities. If you feel able to help at all in any of the support areas you see others filling, please get in touch. Don't put it off. There is a lot of satisfaction to be had from being part of a great organising team, as well as from being a brilliant individual competitor.

My first law of management is that committees never do anything. Only individuals actually do things. So instead of thinking of the Committee as 'them', I want you to think of the Association as 'us'. Then you can also play a part in shaping the way we develop as a mutually supportive group. We want your ideas, and we want your hands, feet and brains as well.

The top end of the sport has been greatly affected, nationally and internationally, over the last two seasons by the grounding of the CAP 230-series aircraft. The coming season should see things get busier in Unlimited, and I know we are all looking forward to that.

We are also seeing a lot of new, talented pilots training for Advanced this summer and I have a sense that we will see some new starts of the future among them.

What we need to keep this going, is, as always, a fresh supply of new faces entering at the lower levels of the sport. The Association, formally, is putting a lot of effort in this field, and I would urge all long-standing members to do as much as they can, personally, to encourage new blood to enter the sport. With this effort, I am sure we can flourish.

3 Financial Report for 2006

Martin Sandford reported on the BAeA's finances in Anne's absence. In 2006 the revenue had bee increased, and so had the costs, but the association ended the year with a healthy balance.

The BAeA operated profitably in 2006

Income £31KExpenditure £25KProfit £6K

- Income rose by £3.5K compared to 2005
 - Subscriptions up by £1K
 - Competition fees up by £1K
 - LOOP Sponsorship £1.5K (£2K by end of calendar year)
- Expenditure was significantly higher than in 2005 (£10K more) but this was in line with the planned budget and reflected the increased activity of the BAeA in 2006.
- Cash reserves are higher than expected at £31K, because many of the grants and equipment costs budgeted were not spent
- Core operating costs associated with running the central activities of the BAeA are still controlled and on budget
- Competition Expenses rose significantly:
 - From £5K in 2005 to £11.5K in 2006
 - 2006 costs included:

- Membership numbers were slightly up compared to 2005
- Competition entries rose, with greater activity at Intermediate and Advanced levels in 2006

- 2007 must focus on bringing in new members and encouraging expansion of Standard Level
- Significant cash reserves are available for development projects in 2007

Although equipment purchases deferred in 2006 they will be made in the first quarter 2007

Simon Abbott had previously checked the accounts, but in October Charles Baker under took the task.

Formal approval of the 2006 accounts was proposed by Ben Ellis and seconded by Ian Scott. Anne Sandford had indicated that she was willing to continue as Treasurer for a further year.

8 BAeA Contest Scoring System 2007

Nick Buckenham has written new software for the BAeA Contest Scoring System

- This new system will be used in 2007
- Results are calculated using the CIVA Fair Play System
- Windows based system, not DOS any more!
- Totally revised contest management tools
- Detailed results, including individual pilot score sheets should be available on the website


The Fair Play system:

- Gives equal importance to each Judge's marks.
- Replaces anomalous grades with statistically fitted values.
- Provides a more informative and "Open" view to Pilots of what has happened to their scores.
- Gives better feedback to the Chief Judge about the standard of scoring.
- And this time it's in Windows, not DOS!

Treatment of Hard Zeros

- The awarding of Hard Zeros is decided for ALL Judges on the Judging Line.
- It is <u>not</u> a majority view any more, the CJ's sheet is the one that has the "Confirmed HZ's". Individual Judges' sheets that have HZ's in other positions or marks where the CJ has indicated a Confirmed HZ will be changed by Fair Play to accord with the Chief Judges view.
- The Chief Judge can be a "scoring" CJ or a "non-scoring" CJ. In either case, it is always the CJ's marks sheet that decides whether HZ's are applied or not.

Grouping of Figures for Fair Play analysis



- In Knowns and Unknowns
 Figures are sorted into
 Groups of similar K values
 before they are analysed.
- For Free sequences the figures are arranged into Groups of the same basic figure type – see left.
- This ensures that "Like" is compared with "Like" when the comparisons are made by the software, to determine whether each Judges mark is in keeping with his own and also all the other Judges' marks.



Mark Jefferies was concerned that the Fair Play system might 'fall over'. He was reassured that it might be the software that 'crashed', not the already tried system. Ben Ellis hoped tat the programme would be as user friendly and bombproof as the current DOS based programme. Graham Hill stated that the programme had the additional benefit of being a training aid for judges.

9 Royal Aero Club matters

Ben Ellis spoke about his role as RAeC and Gasco delegate:

I attend meetings of the Royal Aero Club on your behalf. The main driver for our continuing membership is the requirement by the body governing international competition aerobatics, CIVA (a part of the FAI) that we belong to our National Aero Club. This applies to all aviation sports, so the balloonists, parachutists, glider, hang-glider, micro light and model pilots – in fact anyone who wants to compete internationally in the air - all have to belong.

The traditions of the RAeC span over a century and one major aspect of our activity is the Medals & Awards made annually – but more of that in a moment.

Despite the varied nature of the sports represented, there are many common problems facing us, from increased regulation and charging both in the UK and Europe to potential loss of flying sites and increases in taxation. Lately, the RAeC is doing much to bring together people capable of engaging with our regulators and legislators to fend off these attacks and ensure we get the best possible deal. 2 such are David Roberts who comes from the British Gliding Association and Roger Hopkinson, from the Popular Flying Association. Roger is also the driving force behind the GA Alliance and in my view has done more than any other single individual to advance our cause and help protect our future in the UK. We welcomed Roger to the ranks of the RAeC Council and I hope he has benefited from the support we have been able to give him. Likewise, David Roberts is very active in Europe AirSports which is the main European sporting aviation lobby group which has direct access to EASA. So, if you were to ask me what the purpose of the RAeC is today then I would say that it is to be an effective force to protect the interests of British sporting aviation.

Now, I mentioned the Medals & Awards. I also have a seat on the M&A committee that dishes out these things every year to the Great and the Good. Sometimes the wrangling that goes on and the ebb and flow of argument about who is deserving of which award is very tiring but I'm pleased to say that there was overwhelming support for our submission

for the 'old and bold' award this year, our very own Harry Mason. I do hope that some of you will be able to join us at the ceremony this year. In addition to Harry, you'll get the opportunity to hear some truly heroic stories that are deserving of a wider audience, but sadly, unless sport is about one of the mainstream televised activities, you probably haven't heard of any of it.

GASCo

Practically every UK aviation organisation is represented on the General Aviation Safety Council, including ourselves. Our ability to lobby effectively is hamstrung by our terms of reference which clearly state that comment should be made ONLY on a safety case, no an economic or utility basis. In addition, 50% of GASCo's funding comes from the CAA and they naturally don't want to pay people to object to their activities. My current involvement, apart from attending the regular meetings is to attend a CAA airspace forum on GASCo's behalf.

10 BAeF Progress Update & Fundraising

David Cowden reported on the progress made within the BAeF (British Aerobatic foundation). There had been 32 applicants for the scholarship; this was eventually short listed to 5 pilots with the final two pilots being awarded the scholarship.

2006/2007 Scholarship Winners

David Taudevin

Age 21, David expects to graduate from the University of Sheffield this summer with an honours degree in international politics. He is due to enter the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst in September, with the ultimate aim of becoming a military pilot with the Army Air Corps. David currently works as a ground crewman with Ultimate High Academy at Kemble. Among his other interests he lists mountaineering, sailing, athletics, classic cars and debating.

Jon Gowdy

Age 22, Jon is employed as a staff pilot for the Air Atlantique Classic Flight based at Coventry. In this role he gets to fly such aircraft as the DC-3, Twin Pioneer, Dragon Rapide, Percival Prentice, Pembroke and the DH Dove: in connection with which, Jon holds a Formation Display Authority.

Jon is also a line training captain with Air Atlantique, flying the reconnaissance aircraft engaged in maritime pollution surveillance and mapping operations.

He is a member of the Southdown Gliding Club where he flies gliders and tug aircraft.

The Scholarship entitles the pilots to 50 hours aerobatic training over the next two years. This training will be strict and stringent; if a pilot is found to be failing he will lose the training. The winners are seen as the next generation of aerobatic pilots and they are perceived as good ambassadors for the sport. Their training will be a fast-track to enter at intermediate level.

The programme will be advertised in February for the 2007 scholarship, it is hoped to support the training of one pilot each year for the next four years.

David had circulated a letter to the members before Christmas asking them to consider fund raising to support the British aerobatic teams. Aerobatics is not seen as the medium for lottery funding.

It was suggested that if each member was able to raise £500 each this would have an enormous impetus to a training programme for advanced and unlimited team members. Eric Marsh asked if it was fair to asked members to contribute to what is essentially a 'rich mans sport. Tom Cassells reminded the members that the BAeA had originally been formed to support team members entering international events. It was also asked if the BAeF money could have been spent to support international teams. The meeting was assured that the finances of the BAeA and the BAeF were completely separate.

It was suggested that members might add a donation when renewing their membership.

12 Review of 2006 Season and Award of Trophies

Was it a good summer? Judging by the increase over last year in the percentage of planned sequences flown, up from 76% to 81% for power in the UK, it was. What is even more striking is that this happened whilst the number of planned sequences was raised by 35% and the number actually flown rose by 43% compared with 2005. It was a good year to be flying at Advanced in powered aircraft (88% of planned sequences flown) and an astounding year for gliders (100%); indeed, at Intermediate, more sequences than planned were flown! For powered aircraft, the number of countable sequences for the cross-level tables was driven by Standard (80% 0f 12, rounded down = 9) whilst that to count at Intermediate and Advanced was 12. The details are set out below. All the statistics in this review exclude the Classic Aircraft and YAK 52 events.

During the season 29 pilots competed at least once at Standard (compared with 33 in 2005, 37 in 2004, 34 in 2003 and 44 in 2002), 19 (2005-16, 2004-15, 2003-20, 2002-23) at Intermediate, 18 (16-2005, 2004-

14, 2003-20, 2002-18) at Advanced and 5 (2005-5, 2004-7, 2003-6, 2002-5) at Unlimited. Eliminating duplication from those that flew at more than level, and those that flew only at Waterford, the aggregate number of competition pilots active in the UK amounts to 66 (2005-67, 2004-66, 2003-75, 2002-85).

Looking at the results themselves, the Tiger Club Trophy went to Ed Harding with 258 points out of a possible 270; Stephen Hipwell was 2nd on 241 with the venerable John Wicks (who won the Tiger Trophy) 3rd with 240. Ed Harding also won the Marcus Norman Trophy for Standard Unknowns with 147 out of a possible 150 with the apparent tie for 2nd between John Wicks and Stephen Hipwell on 139 being broken by the former's higher raw score. Paul Tomlinson (winner of both the Tiger Club and Marcus Norman trophies last year) took the Swinstead Trophy for Intermediate pilots with 341 out of a possible 360 leaving Luke

Goddard 2nd on 336 and Mark Davies 3rd on 330. Gary Ferriman chalked up his third successive Manx Kelly victory at Advanced with 358 points out of a possible 360; Cas Smith was 2nd on 340 with Julian Murfitt 3rd on 333.

Two of the 'type' trophies were won by the only person to fly in that type in competition this year; Trevor Bailey in a Cessna Aerobat and John Wicks in a CAP 10 to take the Golden Frog. No-one flew a Slingsby in competition this year.

As ever, and particularly with the large number of sequences flown this year giving 9 sequences to count, the competition for the Pitts trophy was intense. Luke Goddard came out on top with 265 out of a possible 270 points, with Cas Smith 2nd on 259 and with Paul Tomlinson 3rd on 258 equal to the adjusted points achieved by Ed Harding, but with a higher "raw score" total. Possibly partially because of the absence of CAP's for this season, 24 pilots flew an Extra this season. Gary Ferriman came out on top with a "perfect" 270 closely followed by Mark Jefferies on 269 and with LME, Corinne Dennis, on 231. YAK's were flown by 5 pilots, but none flew more than 7 sequences, leaving Andrew Holman-West the winner on 143, Simon Cattlin 2nd on 80 and David Cavell 3rd on 77. I have yet to ask Diana Britten if she believes Elise Mason should be awarded the Diana Britten Graduate Trophy. Elise had an average score of 62.1% at Standard compared with 50.5% achieved by Corinne Dennis after stepping up to Advanced

With up to 8 sequences to count, the result for the chaps who do it without attached engines were very close. The winner was Steve Jarvis with an average of 29.25% followed by Paul Watson on 28.57% and Guy Westgate on 28.50%

Any changes to the rules for next season? Some clarification to make it explicit what happens when a "cut" is imposed before all scheduled sequences have been flown would be sensible; I "ruled" that all scheduled sequences flown count, but some pilots were not happy with this. It would also be sensible to make it explicit that scores from single type events (such as the YAK 52 event) and "specials" such as the Classic Aircraft Event, will not count in the points tables. Otherwise, I believe the system is working well! Anybody differ?


