2 Chairman's Review of 2009







Leon Biancotta Diploma

This Diploma was established in February 1993 on a proposal by the FAI Aerobatics Commission. Widely regarded as one of the finest aerobatic pilots of all times, Leon Biancotto was a member of the French aerobatic team. He lost his life practising for the first FAI World Aerobatic Championships in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia in 1960. Biancotto won the famous Lockheed Aerobatic Trophy in England on three of the six occasions it was held. In 1965, a competition known as the Biancotto Trophy was started which eventually developed into the European Aerobatic Championships. This has only Been previously awarded 4 times.

The Diploma may be awarded on the recommendation of the FAI Aerobatics Commission to individuals or organisations that have contributed significantly to the sport of aerobatics.

The British Aerobatic Association's most notable achievement in 2009 was the organization of the 25th World Aerobatic Championships in Silverstone, United Kingdom. It is widely regarded as the best organized WAC in FAI's history. The BAeA, under the leadership of Chairman Alan Cassidy, has been able to attract a wide array of talent to its organization and their skills were on display in every operational area of the WAC. Its Contest Director, Steve Green, worked tirelessly for the last two years to make every detail perfect. BAeA member Graham Hill served as Chief Judge of the event. Alan Cassidy was its Flight Director. Nick Buckenham has authored a superb software package for FAI Aerobatic Championships worldwide and it was BAeA members that worked on the new "FairPlay System" that is the heart of the software. Aside from the WAC, BAeA organizes a full array of domestic competitions and training camps that would be the envy of organizations one-hundred times its size. They have contributed immeasurably to the promotion of aerobatics in the true spirit of FAI.

The Diploma will be awarded at the FAI council meeting to be held in Dublin later in 2010.

9 BAeA Rule Changes

The BAeA has reviewed its Rules and Operating Procedures extensively over the closed season. Main changes include:

- Revision of the General Rules and Code of Conduct
 All aircraft, including Gliders are required to have a functioning radio
 All pilots are required to give details of their next of kin
- Drafting of a BAeA Safety Analysis and Risk Assessment
 All competition sites are being reviewed to ensure that competition flights take
 place over public areas or private dwellings.
 Following the accident at WAC to BAeA need to be seen to be taking reasonable
 steps to ensure the safety of the public and not put anyone at significant risk.
- Preparation of procedure document to give Contest Directors guidance in the event of incident or accident

10 Glider Issues

Judi Jones has stepped down from the Committee; she has been replaced by Paul Conran.

11 Judging Resources

Graham Hill and Ian Scott stressed that there were very few people willing to come and judge to contests and this was putting a strain on those who did come to events. Those present were encouraged to come to the judging school and to try to attend at least one event a year in order to judge. The Judging school will take place at White Waltham on Saturday 6th March. There will be a briefing for glider judges ahead of the Dam Smith Contest at Dunstable on the evening of Friday 26th March.

12 Royal Aero Club

Ben Ellis sent to following report to the AGM

I have represented the BAeA as a councilmember of the RAeC for the past 10 years or so. The BAeA is required to be a full member of the RAeC so that our pilots can obtain their FAI sporting licence to enable them to compete internationally and, of course, to enable us to stage a World Aerobatic Championship in the UK. Over the years the RAeC has earned considerable respect and influence, using this to great effect when helping to preserve and enhance our freedom to engage in sporting aviation of all kinds, both at home and worldwide. The RAeC chairman, David Roberts, is also President of European Air Sports, previously he was treasurer. EAS has developed great influence with the European Aviation Safety Agency, carrying on the good work started by Sir John Allison. The RAeC has taken a partnership approach and found this much more fruitful than the confrontational attitude adopted by other representative bodies whose views are largely marginalised. We have high hopes concerning sporting and recreational pilot medicals. Dr Peter Saundby, a former RAeC chairman is a leading authority and much respected in Europe. A part of the work the RAeC council does is to formulate policy and agree a mandate for EAS. We also provide financial support for this lobbying on your behalf. The RAeC is entirely funded by subscriptions from member associations. The BAeA pays a modest sum as it is one of the smaller associations (about 8% of that paid by the Aero modellers) All the work done by council members is on a voluntary basis; a part time secretary is employed for a modest fee.

The RAeC has a seat on the CAA's finance watchdog committee. Attending my last meeting last week I was able to raise a couple of interesting questions regarding the cost of licensing small aerodromes There would appear to be some light at the end of the tunnel – following increases of 200% over the last five years. The smallest 40 aerodromes are unlikely to require a licence at all; some of these are aerodromes at which the BAeA holds events and their continued viability is important to us.

The RAeC organises an Annual Medal and Award ceremony and we are still able to press for proper recognition of our members' efforts. The list of award winners goes back over a century and includes some of the most famous names in aviation.

I have has the honour of being vice – Chairman of the RAeC for the past two years and would normally have gone on to do a stint as chairman. Due to my radical change in circumstances I am standing down from this post and the council; Alan Cassidy will be your new council representative.
